Opening Address: What is it about values? Closing Address: Old Maps, New Journeys

As well as being a lecturer at Otago University, Graham is also an ordained Minister in the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. In addition to serving as a parish minister for 17 years, Graham has held several national positions, including Principal of the Knox Centre for Ministry and Leadership (07-14), Moderator of the General Assembly (08-09) and Master (Head) of Knox College (15-21). Throughout his ministry, Graham has enjoyed a strong personal involvement with Presbyterian church schools in Auckland, Wellington and Dunedin, and has served on the Boards of three of those schools: St Kentigern, Scots and Columba. In 2018, he was made a Founder Trustee of St Kentigern. When Graham was Principal of the Knox Centre for Ministry and Leadership he played an instrumental role in the establishment of the Presbyterian Church Schools Resource Office.

He is currently working with the Te Aute Trust Board and Te Pihopatanga o Aotearoa to examine and strengthen Special Character within Māori Anglican Boarding Colleges.

Sharron FabishCulturally responsive and relational educators

Sharron Fabish has been an educator for more than 30 years. She has taught in primary and secondary schools as well as in the tertiary sector. She is currently a professional learning and development facilitator with The University of Auckland, Tui Tuia. She works with school leaders, teachers, and Boards mainly in the areas of cultural capabilities and te reo Māori. Sharron is also a part-time doctoral candidate with The University of Auckland and her research interests are Māori student achievement, school improvement and iwi perspectives of hauora (wellbeing).



Murray Overton (Christian World Service) Operation Refugee

Murray joined CWS as the National Director in August 2021, following a wide ranging career in education, most recently as Principal of Te Kura Tuatahi o Kaiapoi - Kaiapoi Borough School. Murray was a classroom teacher for a number of years, including two years in Dhaka, Bangladesh. As well as serving as a principal in New Zealand schools, he worked in Addis Ababa, Ethiopia for 6 years as the Director of Bingham Academy, a school for students from 4 -18 years. He is keen to explore the intersection of faith and action with students, finding new ways to foster a global worldview with justice at the centre.



Solway CollegeKaitiaki te Kāreti o Manaia - Caregivers of the Manaia block of land.

Solway College made a commitment in their 2020-2022 Strategic plan to recognize and prioritize their commitment as kaitiaki or caregivers of the Manaia block land in which the school now resides. The plan stated it would 'build upon promotion and implementation of sustainability practices at Solway College. Reduce waste, increase recycling, explore solar, expand bush restoration, clean and protect waterways, and increase the profile of sustainability leadership within our school. Strengthen connections with Mana Whenua from Rangitāne o Wairarapa and Ngāti Kahungunu, and build upon opportunities for authentic culturally responsive - place-based learning opportunities'. Solway College now has one of New Zealand's largest school solar installations (over 100kw) and was named New Zealand's Most Sustainable School
